3. Todd Miano, PharmD, PhD, FCCM

the COVID era, but we stuck with it, much thanks to Todd's encouragement. With his patient guidance, was eventually published and has received significant attention now, even opening further doors for me professionally. Since that time, I have worked with Todd closely on one other major project. He approaches all these projects similarly--with incredible dedication and patience towards his team. He is very passionate about advancing science and getting into the nuances of statistical methods. He clearly seeks no recognition, yet he is the driver behind so many successes in scholarship. Something I appreciate very much about Todd is his willingness to not only do the work, but also educate others along the way. I have learned so much from him in every interaction--skills that I have taken away and applied to other projects.
